Park Staff Wins FCPA Stewardship Award

Congratulations to Huntley Meadows Park (HMP) staff and others who worked to create and install the new entryway orientation exhibit at the HMP Visitor Center! Contributing park staff members were honored with a 2020 Fairfax County Park Authority (FCPA) Trailblazers Award for the exhibit, which showcases the link between the built and natural environments of Historic Huntley and HMP. The exhibit presents the two sites in side-by-side dioramas, announcing that "Huntley Connects You to Treasured Habitats and Homes." It includes a topographic map showing Historic Huntley and HMP as a single park comprised of two connecting components. �



A second Huntley? Debbie Robison has theorized that Historic Huntley was named after the Scottish Huntly Castle owned by T.F. Mason's ancestors in "Huntly: Why Was it Built That Way," *Northern Virginia Notes*, January 2, 2015 (available at www.novahistory.org/Huntly/Huntly.htm). A granddaughter of T.F. and Betsey Mason, Virginia Mason Davidge (also known as Mrs. Charles G. Taylor), is listed in



the summer Social Register of 1905 (and later years) as summering at "Huntly" in Portland, Connecticut. Did granddaughter Virginia name her summer home after "our" Huntley; did/does the Huntly home in Connecticut share the same family namesake as our Huntley; or did the two homes just coincidentally bear the same name and a common member of the Mason family? This is one of the many Historic Huntley mysteries—which seem to keep growing—waiting for researchers to resolve! •

President's Column



The year 2020 is finally behind us. We seek the new and the different as a means of resisting "Groundhog Day" living that being confined to home can engender. At their first meeting of 2021, the FOHH Board created two new committees: the Lawncare Research and Lafayette Anniversary Committees.

The mission of the Lawncare Research Committee is to determine whether there are specialized techniques, technologies, and personnel for the care of historic earth terraces, like those that form the Huntley villa's southern lawn. The committee will identify and research relevant written and internet sources, as well as locate and reach out to other historic sites that have terraced grounds.

The Lafayette Anniversary Committee was established in recognition of the upcoming 200th anniversary of General Lafayette's farewell tour of the United States in 1824-25. It is well documented that during his tour Lafavette visited Alexandria, Washington, D.C., Mount Vernon, and Woodlawn for what amounted to a considerable period of time in the vicinity of Historic Huntley. It seems likely that somewhere along the way, T.F., and possibly Betsey, Mason attended one or more social events at which Lafayette was present. The purpose of the committee is to conduct research documenting any meeting between the Masons and Lafayette. A second path of research, if their paths did cross, is to consider how Historic Huntley might participate in marking the anniversary of Lafayette's visit to the area.



Year-Round Huntley Programming

Since opening to the public in 2012, both Historic Huntley programs and house tours were limited to the summer season (April to October). The pandemic has changed that. With people continuing to look for safe social activities outside their homes, demand for house tours continued past the usual October end date. Accordingly, Saturday tours were continued through November and on-site outdoor programs (such as twilight tours, family hilltop outings, and campfire safety) were scheduled throughout the winter months.

Additionally, the pandemic-inspired virtual programming originally created for summer camps continues to be popular in its own right and as a form of complementary instruction for children not physically in schools. These programs know no seasonal restrictions. Time will tell whether that becomes a feature of the post-pandemic "new normal." .*

Enjoy southern Fairfax County's most scenic outlook at **Historic Huntley, the small house with a big view.** A Fairfax County Park Authority site, the property is on the National Register of Historic Places, the Virginia Landmarks Register, and the Fairfax County Inventory of Historic Sites.

On April 24 the **Historic Huntley tour season** kicks off with scheduled Saturday tours and tours at other times by appointment. Tours are limited to one family group of one to nine people. Saturday tours (at 10:30 a.m. and noon) are only by advance ticket purchase beginning in April at **www.fairfaxcounty.gov/parks/historic-huntley/hours-tour**. To schedule a tour by appointment, email kylie.starck@fairfaxcounty.gov.

The grounds are open from dawn to dusk from March through November.
